Following that up, it was determined in October that it would be more cost effective to replace it than to repair, considering it was over 30 years old. Our new boiler has arrived this week, and installation has begun. In the next week or so we should be back to full heat in the pit area of the MS/HS. Thank you to all our communities for supporting our building reserve levies that allow us to fix and replace these higher cost items when they occur!

• Thanks to the Hill County Sheriff's Department for coming out and supporting our schools in the month of November. They were great to work with and offered great support to our students and staff. We will continue to work with and develop our relationship with their staff to support the needs of our schools and students.

• Here's a quick reminder on ICU: This program is to help make all our students at the MS/HS complete all their assignments in a meaningful way. We typically offer it 2 times a week, and students with missing assignments are require to attend after school. They have the option to ride the activity bus home following ICU. Students who need assistance, access to internet or other school resources, or who want a good place to study and work are also welcome to attend. Please help us keep your kids on track with assignments and grades by affirming the importance of getting your work done in a timely manner and attending ICU when necessary.




The elementary students have begun learning about the Zones of Regulation. What is Zones of Regulation? Well to begin to understand what we are teaching, you need to know what self-regulation means.


Self-regulation is the ability to manage your emotions and behavior in accordance with the demands of the situation. It includes being able to resist highly emotional reactions to upsetting stimuli, to calm yourself down when you get upset, to adjust to a change in expectations and to handle frustration without an outburst. It is a set of skills that enables children, as they mature, to direct their own behavior towards a goal, despite the unpredictability of the world and our own feelings. (Child Mind Institute)

The Zones of Regulation is a curriculum that teaches students how to regulate their emotions themselves. It is okay to have different emotions. It is how we deal with those emotions that will determine the outcome of the situation or even life.

Right before Thanksgiving break, the elementary students went to different stations to learn about the different zones and some useful tools to use when they are in "the zone". Every toolbox is different. One tool may not work for another person. We also emphasized that it isn't just kids who are in different zones. Adults have emotions and we find ourselves in different zones as well. Please have a conversation with your child about the zones. As the year continues, we will be learning more about the Zones of Regulation. Here are two tools, of many, that were discussed. Please practice them with your student.



Lazy 8 Breathing



Trace the Lazy 8 with your finger starting at the star and taking a deep breath in.

As you cross over to the other side of the Lazy 8, slowly let your breath out.

Continue breathing around the Lazy 8 until you have a calm body and mind.

Hello from the Science Corner! In the days before Thanksgiving, the 7th grade has been studying the cell and its organelles. We have looked at cells, both plant and animal, in the

microscope. Unfortunately, while the cell membrane, cytoplasm and the nucleus are easy to see, the organelles are way too small. We would need

an actual electron microscope to see them!! The dilemma was solved by creating our own cells out of fun food and candy items. We used a rice cake and frosting to simulate the cell and cytoplasm. A Rolo candy became our nucleus, while chocolate licorice formed the cell membrane. Other cell parts used Fruit Roll-ups as Endoplasmic Reticulum and Golgi



bodies and cinnamon candies as lysosomes. Mike and Ikes became mitochondria, while licorice strings formed the cytoplasm. Candy sprinkles formed the ribosomes. After the students completed the construction of their cells, they ATE THEM!!! How fun is that? It made the cell part very easy to see, and the students really enjoyed eating their product!









FCCLA District Meeting

Eleven members of the North Star FCCLA chapter attended the FCCLA District 3 meeting in Havre on November 6. The meeting was attended by about 50 members and adults from the five schools in our district and was held at the Triangle Communications Meeting room. The day started off with a great presentation by members from Malta FCCLA who talked

about their Farm to School project which earned them a trip to National FCCLA in Atlanta last summer. These students along with others from their Malta Chapter reclaimed a piece of land close to the school, planted a garden and shared the vegetables they grew with the food service at the school. We also heard from Elle Buhl, State VP of Programs about her exchange trip to Japan this summer. She attended school and lived with a family for 3 months this summer. Her trip is an award trip from FCCLA sponsored by Kikkoman Corporation.

Again this year, Montana FCCLA has partnered with the Montana Department of Transportation to bring awareness to their Vision Zero project. This year there will be a special emphasis on Drowsy Driving which is becoming an increasing problem in Montana among all age groups. We were challenged with activities to understand the impact of drowsy driving and learned facts about drowsy driving statistics in Montana. 

This covers all North Star Athletic REGULAR season competitions, EXCLUDES but not limited to the following: Volleyball Showcases Tournament, All Tournament Games- High School and Jr. High, High School Football Playoff Games. Family Season Passes DO NOT INCLUDE COLLEGE AGE CHILDREN.

Anyone caught abusing this policy will lose Season Pass admittance and money will be non-refundable.

Transcripts Beginning with the Class of 2018 and subsequent classes, transcript requests can be made electronically through Parchment. Transcripts are free for two years following graduation. After that, there is a \$3.15 fee that will be collected by Parchment. Destinations such as colleges, NCAA, Common Application or yourself can be requested. In three easy steps, you can order your transcript: 1. Register for your free account at parchment.com. 2. Request your transcript. 3. Track your transcript. 
